

This presentation will explore James Weldon Johnson Park in Jacksonville, Florida as a site of contested memory, specifically of racial violence and Black resistance. It will also discuss this public space as a lens to understand Black history in Florida and important activists such as A. Philip Randolph, Mary McLeod Bethune, Eartha White, and Rodney Hurst.

Felicia Bevel is an Assistant Professor of History at the University of North Florida. Her research and teaching interests include African American History, 20th century U.S. history,

cultural history, southern studies, and childhood studies. At UNF, she teaches courses on topics such as the civil rights movement and Black Transnationalism. She also serves on the advisory boards of the Digital Humanities Institute and Africana Studies. Before joining UNF, she was a doctoral candidate in the American Studies department at Brown University, where she graduated in May 2019. She also holds a B.A. in Sociology (with a concentration in African American Studies) from Columbia University.

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
