

U-Boats, Saboteurs, and Orange Groves: Florida in World War II



Florida's role in World War II was far more consequential to the safety of the United States than people realize. Once the War broke out, Germany was probing America's doorstep with submarines and saboteurs. At the time, Florida was the largest state surrounded by water and America increased its defense by creating airbases and naval bases to combat enemy intrusion. Pensacola grew to be a major military base for training men for the conflict overseas and pilots would learn how to operate aircraft for service in the Pacific and Europe. The state also became a haven

for German prisoners of war from North Africa and a scene for sinking merchant vessels bound for England. Learn how Florida was necessary in the defense of the mainland United States against Nazi tyranny and how it would help win the largest war in history.
